Here are a few updates for this month:

Rent Payments

Please be reminded that rent is due on the first of each month with a five-day grace period before a \$15.00 administrative fee is charged to your account. Rents not received by the 20th of the month will result in a Termination of Tenancy and an additional \$25.00 administrative fee. Just a reminder that we are not able to accept cash for rent, but will require a check or a money order. Another option for you to consider is automatic monthly payments from an account that you authorize your bank to make on your behalf. Parking and Unauthorized Vehicles

Just a few reminders regarding RHA parking lots:

- Parking is for RHA residents and authorized guests only.
- All vehicles on RHA property must be registered, inspected and in good repair.
- Repairs to cars are not allowed in RHA parking lots.
- Cars leaking fuel or oil are prohibited. Tenants will be charged for damage to parking lots.

Cars in violation of the above rules are subject to towing at the owner's expense.

Last year we resealed and restriped the driveways and parking lots at Hickory Street and Sheldon Towers. We ask that you cooperate in keeping these areas free from damages caused by leaking automobiles.

2024 Resident Scholarship Program **Now Accepting Applications**

As I reported last month, HAI Group, our property and liability insurer, is now accepting applications for their 2024 Resident Scholarship Program. This program helps low-income students pay for higher education. To date, more than 1.6 million dollars has been awarded to nearly 500 students, who have gone on to careers in nursing, education, social work, and more, across the country. This year, they will be awarding scholarships worth \$6.000 each to 20 residents to continue their education. Students may enter and be awarded scholarships for up to four consecutive years. Affordable Connectivity Program

The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a federal program that provides eligible households a discount on their internet.

- Internet can be for computer, or
- Data for Smart phone /mobile device
- One benefit per household
- Discount of \$30 off your bill

The first step of this process takes very little time; however, actually getting the benefit applied to your service provider is a lot more complex. Also, please be aware that the program is not currently accepting applications, but you will be placed on a wait list for when the program reopens

Who is eligible?

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least one of the criteria below:

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program or participates in one of these assistance programs:
- Free or Reduced Price School **Lunch Program or School** Breakfast Program, including at U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Community Eligibility Provision schools.
- **SNAP**
- Medicaid
- Federal Housing Assistance, including: Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program, Project **Based Section 8 Program** residents and affordable Housing Programs for American Indians, Alaska Natives or Native Hawaiians
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- WIC
- Veterans Pensions or Survivor Benefits, or
- Lifeline



TICKET PRICES \$25 All-Inclusive Ticket: With this ticket, you can sample spirits, beer, cider, mead, and wine from vendors hosted at Downtown Rutland businesses. You'll receive a wristband if you're 21 or over, a shopping bag with a map of all participating businesses, and one entry into a raffle for items from vendors and businesses. Plus, ticket holders are eligible for additional door prizes and raffle prizes throughout the event!

Important information: You must be 21 or older to sample alcoholic beverages and present a valid ID at check-in. You must have a wristband to sample alcoholic beverages. Drinking responsibly is highly encouraged, and we suggest pre-arranging a designated driver or taking the Bus.

\$15 Non-Drinking Ticket: If you don't drink alcohol or are a designated driver, you can still enjoy the Sip & Shop with this non-drinking ticket option. This ticket allows you to sample food and taste non-alcoholic drink vendors, receive one entry into the raffle, and be eligible for door prizes!

Many thanks go out to tenants who plant flowers and such around the property. Your efforts to beautify your area are appreciated. A few things to be mindful of when taking on beautification efforts:

- Mulch cannot be within 18 inches around combustible exteriors of buildings such as wood or vinyl per the Comprehensive Fire Safety Code 527 CMR17
- 2. New gardens cannot be installed without prior approval from the Rutland Housing Authority
- 3. If planting areas are not clearly defined, our maintenance staff may mistake the plants for weeds and cut them down.
- 4. Any plants, decorations, etc. may be taken by others as they are in common areas and not secured.
- Garden areas are for all to enjoy, please don't post signs in an attempt to keep others from using the area.
- Decorations cannot impede the ability of people to pass by easily on walkways. A person using an assistive device needs to be able to safely pass. Additionally, the grassy area must be easily accessible for mowing by our maintenance staff.
- 7. The RHA does not provide storage areas for excess garden supplies or tools.
- 8. Storage containers cannot be erected on RHA property.
- 9. Patios and walkways cannot be installed.
- 10. Decorations cannot be political in nature or offensive to any group of people based on national origin, race, sex, orientation, religion or any other protected class.

- 11. Garden hoses are the responsibility of tenants and cannot be left lying on the ground or cannot cross sidewalks. Water must be turned off at the spigot when not in use.
- 12. Sprinklers, drip systems, etc. cannot be used.
- 13. Do not discard unbagged leaves/garden waste in dumpsters.
- 14. Do not discard unbagged leaves/garden waste in dumpsters.

A few reminders for all residents!

- 1. If you have a pet it is your responsibility to pick up after it
- 2. Porches need to be kept clear.

 Acceptable furniture, plants... no clutter or trash
- 3. Absolutley no smoking in apartments. You must be 25ft away from the building
- 4. YOU are responsible for your guests.
- 5. Are you considering an overnight guest? If your guest will be staying for more than 3 days you must notify RHA in writing. Upon written request from you and approval by RHA a guest can remain in the unit for up to, but no longer than (14) consecutive days or a total of (30) cumulative calendar days during any twelve month period.

When you have a guest for more Than 3 days, you cannot have Another overnight guest for the next forty-five (45) days.
